SCRIPTURE READING Psalm 90:1–17; Psalm 40:1–4; Psalm 23 Pastor Tom Jones

Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God. You return man to dust and say, "Return. O children of man!" For a thousand years in your sight are but as vesterday when it is past, or as a watch in the night. You sweep them away as with a flood; they are like a dream, like grass that is renewed in the morning: in the morning it flourishes and is renewed; in the evening it fades and withers. For we are brought to an end by your anger; by your wrath we are dismayed. You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence. For all our days pass away under your wrath; we bring our years to an end like a sigh. The years of our life are seventy, or even by reason of strength eighty; yet their span is but toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away. Who considers the power of your anger, and your wrath according to the fear of you? So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom.

Return, O LORD! How long? Have pity on your servants! Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days. Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, and for as many years as we have seen evil. Let your work be shown to your servants, and your glorious power to their children. Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us; yes, establish the work of our hands!

SCRIPTURE READING

Romans 8:31-39; 2 Corinthians 4:16-5:5; Job 19:25–26; 1 Corinthians 15:54–58 Pastor David Stain

What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised— who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?

Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or

nakedness, or danger, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered."

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

"So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal. For we know that if the tent that is our earthly home is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. For in this tent we groan, longing to put on our heavenly dwelling, if indeed by putting it on we may not be found naked. For while we are still in this tent, we groan, being burdened—not that we would be unclothed, but that we would be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee.


For I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God.

OBITUARY

The Reverend Albert Frank Moginot went to be with the Lord in the early morning of December 17th. He was 88. "Bud" is now reunited with his beloved Vivian. The couple had been married for 62 years.

Bud was a devoted father to Barbara of Canton, Ohio, and a daughter–in–law, Monica Harris, of Godfrey, Illinois. He leaves one grandson, Robert, and his wife, Michael Ann, of Alton, Illinois and their two children, Benjamin and William, as well as many nieces and nephews.

In addition to Vivian, he was preceded in death by his sister, Jane, Ackerman, his son, Paul Albert Moginot, and his grandson, Steven Albert Moginot.

Bud was born on January 19, 1923 to Albert Frank Sr. and Marie Hartman in St. Louis, Missouri. He graduated from Cleveland High School and attended Olive Branch Congregation. He then attended Bryan College in Dayton, Tennessee, and completed his Bachelor's degree at Washington University in St. Louis.

Bud received both a Bachelor of Divinity and a Master of Theology degree from Dallas Theological Seminary in Texas. He then served as an Assistant Pastor to Dr. Francis Schaeffer at the First Bible Presbyterian Church in St. Louis. While working there he became acquainted with Dr. Schaeffer's young secretary, Vivian Angeline Musterman. Their friendship was to become lifelong.

In 1948 Bud was ordained as a minister in the Bible Presbyterian Church. In the same year, Bud and Vivian were married. He faithfully served as Pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Alton, Illinois for twenty–five years, and the next nineteen years as the Director of Building and Grounds for the Covenant Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri. During his time at Covenant Seminary he also served as Interim Pastor at the Franklin Reformed Presbyterian Church of Union, Missouri. He then became an Assistant Pastor at the Twin Oaks Presbyterian Church of St. Louis where he served for twenty years.

Bud had also served with distinction as the Stated Clerk of the Reformed Presbyterian Church (Evangelical Synod) for twenty-five years.

Bud was active for many years in leadership of Presbytery summer camps for children.

Bud had hoped to serve as a military chaplain in World War II but the war ended too soon for him. His desire to serve the men in uniform was fulfilled in later years as Bud served the Missouri Civil Air Patrol for twenty-five years attaining the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

On April 27, 2008, Twin Oaks named Bud Pastor Emeritus in accordance with the Book of Church Order of the Presbyterian Church in America which commands this recognition and distinction be conferred upon fathers in the faith who have distinguished themselves by earnest labors among the people of God.

Bud and Vivian traveled everywhere together. His devotion to her was just as powerful as their dedication to those around them as they ministered to family and friends, neighbors and congregants, as well as the sick and needy.

Bud always put His Savior first and put others before himself. One of his favorite Bible verses was Philippians 1:21, *"For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."* Now he has gained his heavenly reward and is reunited with his precious Vivian, son Paul, and grandson, Steven, in the presence of his Savior, Jesus Christ.
